Dear Brothers and Sisters in Christ,

Staying with the theme of looking at some of the great saints and heroes of our Faith, Thursday we celebrated the Memorial of bishop St. Athanasius of Alexandria. Besides having a long, fancy name, he was a pivotal figure in the early Church, an early Church Father, and Doctor of the Church.

Athanasius was born in Alexandria in Egypt around the year 297 and was very quickly recognized by the bishop as a brilliant and holy young man. He had an innate grasp of theology from that age, and quickly was taken under the wing of the bishop for education and formation. When he was about 19, he went into the desert to glean the wisdom of the great hermit and father of religious life, St. Antony of Egypt (or Antony of the Desert), where he got a great formation in prayer and relationship with the Blessed Trinity. He would later write the definitive biography of this great saint, which is still a classic to this day.

While still a young man, the bishop Alexander ordained him as a deacon and put him in charge of many things in the diocese of Alexandria, essentially making him his right-hand man. He was the theological advisor to the bishop at the Council of Nicea in 325 AD. The council was called to address the issue of the Arian heresy, and would condemn the ideas of Arius, who taught that Jesus was more than human, but was not really God. The issue was not over after the council however, and for the next 200 years Arianism would continue to divide the Church and be a thorn in the side of Athanasius for the rest of his life.

In 328 AD, Alexander died, and Athanasius was acclaimed to succeed him as bishop. This was a post he would hold for the rest of his 45 years of life. Most of this was very contentious, and he spent many of the first 30 years of his episcopate actually in exile and in hiding from hostile Arian forces. He was exiled 5 separate times from Alexandria!

Unfortunately for the early Church, Arianism was very popular, especially among the ruling class, and therefore those who held to authentic Christian beliefs were often set upon by those in secular authority. Despite all of this, Athanasius held to what he knew to be Truth, and suffered for it. Though he escaped execution and martyrdom on many occasions, we could definitely say he suffered a long-lasting and lonely martyrdom of the soul for much of his life. He is truly a heroic example of patient suffering. And he was patient, even being gracious and kind to those who opposed him.

His greatest teachings and writings and contributions, however, would lay the groundwork for Church councils for the next 125 years as they sought to more precisely define our beliefs about Jesus Christ, and the Blessed Trinity in general. The Creed that we pray every Sunday was made possible through his work and wisdom as given by God, and his persistence and courage throughout all the difficulties of his life preserved the authentic Faith for us throughout the centuries. He is truly a hero for us, because without his holding the line on true doctrine, our Faith in the divinity of Jesus and His necessity to come to the Father and to heaven would likely have been lost. The world would very much be a darker place without him having been in it! St. Athanasius of Alexandria, pray for us!! In Christ, the Son of God, - Fr. Chris


